This notice may be supplemented with any new significant facts learned subsequent to its submission. By providing this notice, Serviceaide does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Nebraska law, the applicability of the Nebraska data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On November 15, 2024, Serviceaide learned that certain patient information within its Catholic Health database was inadvertently made publicly available between September 19, 2024 and November 5, 2024. In response, Serviceaide promptly secured the Catholic Health database and initiated an investigation to determine the nature and scope of the event. While no evidence was found indicating the information was copied, the investigation could not definitively rule it out. As a result, a data review vendor was engaged to conduct a comprehensive and time-intensive review of the potentially impacted data to identify any personal health information contained therein and to whom that information relates, and address information to be used for notifying potentially impacted individuals. This review was recently completed.

The information that could have been subject to unauthorized access includes name, Social Security number, date of birth, medical record number, patient account numbers, medical and health information, health insurance information, prescription/treatment information, clinical information, provider name and address, and email/username and password.

Notice to Nebraska Residents

On May 9, 2025, Serviceaide provided written notice of this incident to approximately ten (10) Nebraska residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as *Exhibit A*.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, Serviceaide moved quickly to investigate and respond to the incident, assess the security of the Catholic Health database, and identify potentially affected individuals. Serviceaide is also working to implement additional safeguards and training to its employees. Serviceaide is providing access to credit monitoring services for twelve (12) months, through TransUnion, to individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by this incident, at no cost to these individuals.

Additionally, Serviceaide is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud, including advising individuals to report any suspected incidents of identity theft or fraud to their credit card company and/or bank. Serviceaide is providing individuals with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one's credit file, information on protecting against tax fraud, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

Serviceaide is providing written notice of this incident to relevant state and federal regulators, as necessary, and to the three major credit reporting agencies, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. Serviceaide is also notifying the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and prominent media pursuant to the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA).

NOTICE OF SECURITY INCIDENT

Dear [REDACTED]:

Serviceaide, Inc. ("Serviceaide") is a provider of information technology support management services to Catholic Health from where you may have received medical care. Serviceaide is writing to inform you of an event that may have impacted the privacy of some of your personal information. Although at this time there is no indication that your information has been accessed or used to commit identity theft or fraud in relation to this event, we are providing you with information about the event, our response, and steps you may take to help protect your information, should you feel it necessary to do so.

What Happened? On November 15, 2024, Serviceaide learned that certain information within its Catholic Health Elasticsearch database was inadvertently made publicly available. In response, we promptly took steps to secure Catholic Health's Elasticsearch database and initiated an investigation into the nature and scope of the event. The investigation determined that between September 19, 2024 and November 5, 2024, certain patient information was publicly available. Please note, the investigation did not identify any evidence that information was copied, but we are unable to rule out this type of activity. As such, a data review vendor was engaged to conduct a comprehensive and time-intensive review of the potentially impacted data to identify any personal health information contained therein and to whom that information relates. On March 20, 2025, we received the results of this extensive review process from the data review vendor. Since then, we have engaged in additional work to review and verify the information and locate address information for the potentially impacted population. We recently completed this analysis and confirmed that certain information related to you was contained within the potentially impacted data.

What Information Was Involved? The review determined the universe of potential information present in the impacted data may include name, Social Security number, date of birth, medical record number, patient account number, medical/health information, health insurance information, prescription/treatment information, clinical information, provider name, provider location, and email/username and password. While we are unaware of any actual or attempted misuse of your information as a result of this event, we are notifying you out of an abundance of caution.

What We Are Doing. The confidentiality, privacy, and security of personal information within our care are among Serviceaide's highest priorities. Upon learning of this event, we secured the Catholic Health Elasticsearch database, investigated what happened, and reviewed the potentially impacted data to identify any individuals that may have been affected. As part of our ongoing commitment to the privacy of information in our care, we have implemented additional security measures to further protect against similar events occurring in the future. We also reported this event to applicable government regulators, including the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Additionally, we are offering credit monitoring and identity theft protection services for twelve (12) months through Cyberscout, a TransUnion company, at no cost to you. Please note that you will not be automatically enrolled in these services. Should you wish to do so, you will need to enroll yourself in these services, as we are not able to do so on your behalf. You may find instructions on how to enroll in these services in the enclosed *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Personal Information*.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitoring your credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors. Please review the enclosed *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Personal Information* for useful information on what you can do to better protect against possible misuse of your information. There you will also find more information on the complimentary credit monitoring and identity protection services we are making available to you, free of cost.

STEPS YOU CAN TAKE TO HELP PROTECT PERSONAL INFORMATION

Enroll in Credit Monitoring and Restoration

To enroll in Credit Monitoring services at no charge, please log on to <https://bfs.cyberscout.com/activate> and follow the instructions provided. When prompted please provide the following unique code to receive services: [REDACTED]. In order for you to receive the monitoring services described above, you must enroll within 90 days from the date of this letter. The enrollment requires an internet connection and e-mail account and may not be available to minors under the age of 18 years of age. Please note that when signing up for monitoring services, you may be asked to verify personal information for your own protection to confirm your identity.



Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order your free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. You may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of your credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If you are a victim of identity theft, you are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should you wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any one of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a “credit freeze” on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer’s express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in your name without your consent. However, you should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in your credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application you make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, you cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on your credit report. To request a security freeze, you may need to provide the following information, depending on whether the request is made online, by phone, or by mail:

1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver’s license or ID card, etc.); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if you are a victim of identity theft.
