

EXHIBIT 1

Scharnhorst Ast Kennard Griffin PC (“SAKG”) is located at 1100 Walnut Street, Suite 1950, Kansas City, Missouri 64106, and writes to notify your office of a data privacy event. This notice may be supplemented if significant new facts are learned subsequent to its submission. By providing this notice, SAKG does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Nebraska law, the applicability of the Nebraska data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Please note that SAKG is a law firm that represents many different organizations and individuals across many different sectors. While some of the notified individuals have a direct relationship with SAKG, a number of the potentially impacted individuals are affiliated with SAKG’s clients, whose information was obtained by SAKG during the course of its representation of said clients.

Nature of the Data Event

On Thursday, August 1, 2024, SAKG became aware of suspicious activity within its email and Dropbox environments. SAKG promptly launched an investigation into the nature and scope of the activity with the assistance of third-party forensic specialists. The investigation determined that certain information stored within SAKG’s email environment was viewed or taken by an unauthorized actor between July 17, 2024, and August 6, 2024. The investigation also determined that the unauthorized actor was able to gain unauthorized access to an SAKG employee’s Dropbox account for a limited period of time. SAKG could not definitively determine what particular data found in the Dropbox account was accessed by the unauthorized actor. Therefore, SAKG took the most conservative approach, considering everything in the Dropbox account to be at risk in an abundance of caution.

In response to identifying this activity, and the potential impact to data, SAKG undertook a comprehensive review of the files in Dropbox, as well as the affected emails, with the assistance of third-party specialists. Through that review, SAKG determined that certain information related to residents of Nebraska was contained within the potentially affected files.

SAKG’s investigation and review determined the information that could have been subject to unauthorized access includes individuals’ names and Social Security numbers.

Notice to Nebraska Residents

On or about April 14, 2025, SAKG provided written notice of this incident to approximately three (3) Nebraska residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as ***Exhibit A***.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon becoming aware of the event, SAKG moved quickly to investigate and respond to the same, assess the security of SAKG systems, and identify potentially affected individuals. SAKG is also working to implement additional safeguards and training to its employees. SAKG is providing access to credit monitoring services for twelve (12) months, through IDX, to individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by this incident, at no cost to these individuals.

Additionally, SAKG is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud. SAKG is providing individuals with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one's credit file, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

SAKG is also providing written notice of this incident to relevant state and federal regulators, including the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services ("HHS/OCR") at the request of its medical provider clients and pursuant to the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA).

NOTICE OF <<SECURITY INCIDENT/DATA BREACH>>

Scharnhorst Ast Kennard Griffin, PC (“SAKG”) writes to inform you of an event that may have impacted the confidentiality of some of your information. Although we are unaware of any identity theft or fraud occurring as a result of this event, we are providing you with information about the event, our response, and resources available to help you protect your information, should you feel it appropriate to do so.

What Happened? On Thursday, August 1, 2024, SAKG became aware of suspicious activity within its email and Dropbox environments. We promptly launched an investigation into the nature and scope of the activity with the assistance of third-party forensic specialists. The investigation determined that certain information stored within our email environment was viewed or taken by an unauthorized actor between July 17, 2024 and August 6, 2024. We also determined that the unauthorized actor was able to gain unauthorized access to a SAKG employee’s Dropbox account for a limited period of time, although we could not definitively determine what particular data found in the Dropbox account was accessed by the unauthorized actor. Nonetheless, in response, and in an abundance of caution, SAKG undertook a comprehensive review of the files in Dropbox, as well as the affected emails, with the assistance of third-party specialists. The purpose of that review was to identify what information was contained therein and to whom that information related. Through that review, SAKG determined that certain information related to you was contained within the potentially affected files.

What Information Was Involved? Our investigation and review determined that the following types of information related to you were found in the potentially affected files: your name, <<DATA ELEMENTS>>. Please note that SAKG is not aware of any attempted or actual misuse of your information, or that your information was used to commit identity theft or fraud.

What We Are Doing. The confidentiality, privacy, and security of information in our care is among our highest priorities. Upon becoming aware of the referenced suspicious activity, we promptly commenced an investigation to confirm the nature and scope of the event. We also promptly notified federal law enforcement. We are reviewing existing security policies and have implemented additional cybersecurity measures to further protect against similar events moving forward. We are also notifying potentially impacted individuals, including you, so you may take steps to best protect your information, should you feel it is appropriate to do so.

As an added precaution, we are also offering you immediate access to credit monitoring and identity theft protection services for <<twelve (12)/twenty-four (24)>> months at no cost to you, through IDX. You can find information on how to enroll in these services in the enclosed *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Personal Information*. We encourage you to enroll in these services as we are not able to do so on your behalf. Please note the deadline to enroll is July 14, 2025.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors. You may also enroll in the complimentary credit monitoring services we are offering. Please also review the information contained in the enclosed *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Personal Information*.

Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Personal Information

Enroll in Credit Monitoring Services

- 1. Website and Enrollment.** Scan the QR image or go to <https://app.idx.us/account-creation/protect> and follow the instructions for enrollment using your Enrollment Code provided at the top of the letter.
- 2. Activate the credit monitoring** provided as part of your IDX identity protection membership. The monitoring included in the membership must be activated to be effective. Note: You must have established credit and access to a computer and the internet to use this service. If you need assistance, IDX will be able to assist you.
- 3. Telephone.** Contact IDX at 1-800-939-4170 to gain additional information about this event and speak with knowledgeable representatives about the appropriate steps to take to protect your credit identity.

Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order a free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. Consumers may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of their credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If consumers are the victim of identity theft, they are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should consumers wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a “credit freeze” on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer’s express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in a consumer’s name without consent. However, consumers should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in their credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application they make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, consumers cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on their credit report. To request a credit freeze, individuals may need to provide some or all of the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver’s license or ID card, etc.); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if they are a victim of identity theft.

Consumers may further educate themselves regarding identity theft, fraud alerts, credit freezes, and the steps they can take to protect your personal information by contacting the consumer reporting bureaus, the Federal Trade Commission, or their state Attorney General. The Federal Trade Commission also encourages those who discover that their information has been misused to file a complaint with them. Consumers have the right to file a police report if they ever experience identity theft or fraud. Please note that in order to file a report with law enforcement for identity theft, consumers will likely need to provide some proof that they have been a victim. Instances of known or suspected identity theft should also be reported to law enforcement and the relevant state Attorney General. This notice has not been delayed by law enforcement.

Further, pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act, the consumer reporting bureaus must correct or delete inaccurate, incomplete, or unverifiable information; consumer reporting agencies may not report outdated negative information; access to consumers' files is limited; consumers must give consent for credit reports to be provided to employers; consumers may limit "prescreened" offers of credit and insurance based on information in their credit report; and consumers may seek damages from violators. Consumers may have additional rights under the Fair Credit Reporting Act not summarized here. Identity theft victims and active-duty military personnel have specific additional rights pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act.
