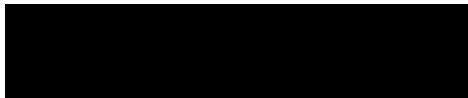

Notice of Data Incident

Indico Data Solutions (“Indico”) recently experienced a data security incident that may have impacted some of your personal information. Indico is a vendor that provides data ingestion and workflow organization services to companies in various industries and would have your information if provided by a customer. We take the security and privacy of all information seriously and sincerely apologize for any inconvenience this incident may cause you. This letter contains information about steps you can take to protect your information and resources we are making available to help you.

What Happened? On May 7, 2026, Indico determined that it had suffered a cybersecurity incident which may have involved unauthorized access to various online repositories containing customer information. We immediately implemented our incident response protocols, took steps to secure our environment, and worked with external cybersecurity specialists to investigate. On August 3, 2026, we determined that some of your personal information was present in documents stored in the online repositories.

What Information Was Involved? Information that may have been present includes your name, Social Security Number, Account Number and Institution Name.

What We Are Doing: We have taken steps to help prevent a similar incident in the future, including, but not limited to, rotating access credentials, implementing additional monitoring tools, and tightening access controls.

In addition, although there has been no evidence that your information was misused, we are offering you **Single Bureau Credit Monitoring/Single Bureau Credit Report/Single Bureau Credit Score** services at no charge. These services provide you with alerts for 24 months from the date of enrollment when changes occur to your credit file. This notification is sent to you the same day that the change or update takes place with the bureau.

Finally, we are providing you with proactive fraud assistance to help with any questions that you might have or in event that you become a victim of fraud. These services will be provided by Cyberscout, a TransUnion company specializing in fraud assistance and remediation services.

How do I enroll for the free services? To enroll in Credit Monitoring services at no charge, please log on to <https://bfs.cyberscout.com/activate> and follow the instructions provided. When prompted please provide the following unique code to receive services: [REDACTED] In order for you to receive the monitoring services described above, you must enroll within 90 days from the date of this letter. The enrollment requires an internet connection and e-mail account and may not be available to minors under the age of 18 years of age. Please note that when signing up for monitoring services, you may be asked to verify personal information for your own protection to confirm your identity.

What You Can Do: We encourage you to remain vigilant by reviewing your account statements and credit reports for any unauthorized activity over the next 12 months. If you see any suspicious activity, you should immediately contact your financial institution. Additional information about protecting your identity is included in this letter, including recommendations by the Federal Trade Commission regarding identity theft protection and details on how to place a fraud alert or a security freeze on your credit file. We also encourage you to take full advantage of the service offering through Cyberscout.

For More Information: Representatives are available for 90 days from the date of this letter to assist you with questions regarding this incident, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Eastern Time, Monday through Friday, excluding holidays. Please call 866-899-6991 and supply the fraud specialist with your unique code listed above.

Protecting all information in our control is important to us, and we sincerely apologize for any concern this incident may cause you.

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Recommended Steps to help Protect your Information

1. Website and Enrollment. You can enroll in the complimentary credit monitoring services being offered to you by logging on to <https://bfs.cyberscout.com/activate> and following the provided instructions. When prompted, please provide the unique code provided in this letter. The enrollment requires an internet connection and email account and may not be available to minors. Please note that when signing up for monitoring services, you may be asked to verify personal information for your own protection to confirm your identity.

2. Review your credit reports. We recommend that you remain vigilant by reviewing account statements and monitoring credit reports. Under federal law, you also are entitled every 12 months to one free copy of your credit report from each of the three major credit reporting companies. To obtain a free annual credit report, go to www.annualcreditreport.com or call 1-877-322-8228. You may wish to stagger your requests so that you receive a free report by one of the three credit bureaus every four months.

You should also know that you have the right to file a police report if you ever experience identity fraud. Please note that in order to file a crime report or incident report with law enforcement for identity theft, you will likely need to provide some kind of proof that you have been a victim. A police report is often required to dispute fraudulent items. You can report suspected incidents of identity theft to local law enforcement or to the Attorney General.

3. Place Fraud Alerts with the three credit bureaus. If you choose to place a fraud alert, we recommend you do this after activating your credit monitoring. You can place a fraud alert at one of the three major credit bureaus by phone and also via Experian's or Equifax's website. A fraud alert tells creditors to follow certain procedures, including contacting you, before they open any new accounts or change your existing accounts. For that reason, placing a fraud alert can protect you, but also may delay you when you seek to obtain credit. The contact information for all three bureaus is as follows:

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It is necessary to contact only ONE of these bureaus and use only ONE of these methods. As soon as one of the three bureaus confirms your fraud alert, the others are notified to place alerts on their records as well.

You will receive confirmation letters in the mail and will then be able to order all three credit reports, free of charge, for your review. An initial fraud alert will last for one year.

Please Note: No one is allowed to place a fraud alert on your credit report except you.

4. Security Freeze. By placing a security freeze, someone who fraudulently acquires your personal identifying information will not be able to use that information to open new accounts or borrow money in your name. You will need to contact the three national credit reporting bureaus listed above to place the freeze. Keep in mind that when you place the freeze, you will not be able to borrow money, obtain instant credit, or get a new credit card until you temporarily lift or permanently remove the freeze. There is no cost to freeze or unfreeze your credit files.

5. You can obtain additional information about the steps you can take to avoid identity theft from the following agencies. The Federal Trade Commission also encourages those who discover that their information has been misused to file a complaint with them.
