This notice will be supplemented with any new significant facts learned subsequent to its submission. By providing this notice, Episciences does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Nebraska law, the applicability of the Nebraska data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On April 29, 2025, Episciences learned of suspicious activity on certain systems within its network. Episciences immediately launched an investigation to determine the nature and scope of the activity. The investigation determined that the unauthorized actor gained access to certain files within the Episciences network between April 27, 2025, and April 29, 2025, and may have copied those files. Following the investigation, Episciences undertook a detailed review of all the files potentially impacted to determine what information was present in these files and to whom it related. On June 3, 2025, Episciences finalized this review and determined that information related to certain individuals could have been affected. To date, Episciences have seen no evidence of any fraudulent use of any data as a result of this event.

The information that could have been subject to unauthorized access includes name and Social Security Number.

Notice to Nebraska Residents

On August 6, 2025, Episciences provided written notice of this incident to two (2) Nebraska residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as ***Exhibit A***.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, Episciences moved quickly to investigate, assess the security of its systems, and identify potentially affected individuals. Further, Episciences notified federal law enforcement of the event and implemented additional security measures. Episciences is providing individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by this incident with access to complimentary credit monitoring services for twelve (12) months through TransUnion.

Additionally, Episciences is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud, including advising individuals to report any suspected incidents of identity theft or fraud to their credit card company and/or bank. Episciences is providing individuals with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one's credit file, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud. Episciences is also notifying state regulators of the event as necessary.

NOTICE OF SECURITY INCIDENT

Episciences, Inc. ("Episciences") is writing to notify you of an incident that may have impacted some of your personal information. This letter provides details of the incident, our response, and steps you may wish to take to help protect your information - should you feel it is appropriate to do so.

What Happened? On April 29, 2025, Episciences learned of suspicious activity on certain systems within its network. Episciences immediately launched an investigation to determine the nature and scope of the activity. The investigation determined that an unauthorized actor gained access to certain files within our network between April 27, 2025, and April 29, 2025, and may have copied those files. Following the investigation, Episciences undertook a detailed review of all the files potentially impacted to determine what information was present and to whom it related. On June 3, 2025, Episciences finalized this review and determined that personal information related to you could have been affected.

What Information Was Involved? The information potentially impacted by this incident includes your name and Social Security number.

What We Are Doing. Episciences takes the confidentiality, privacy, and security of information in its care very seriously. Upon learning of the incident, Episciences conducted a diligent investigation, took prompt steps to ensure the security of its network, and conducted a comprehensive review of the information potentially affected. Episciences also enhanced its existing security protocols.

As an added precaution, Episciences is providing you with access to credit monitoring services through TransUnion for 12 months at no cost to you. Information regarding these services and instructions on how to activate them may be found in the enclosed *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Information*. **Please note that while Episciences, Inc. will cover the cost of the monitoring service on your behalf, we are not permitted to enroll you in these services on your behalf. You must complete the enrollment process yourself.**

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud. You may enroll in the complimentary services we have made available to you. Regularly reviewing your account statements and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors is also recommended.

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STEPS YOU CAN TAKE TO PROTECT YOUR INFORMATION

Enroll in Monitoring Services

In response to the incident, we are providing you with access to **Single Bureau Credit Monitoring/Single Bureau Credit Report/Single Bureau Credit Score** services at no charge. These services provide you with alerts for 12 months from the date of enrollment when changes occur to your credit file. This notification is sent to you the same day that the change or update takes place with the bureau. Finally, we are providing you with proactive fraud assistance to help with any questions that you might have or in event that you become a victim of fraud. These services will be provided by Cyberscout, a TransUnion company specializing in fraud assistance and remediation services.

To enroll in Credit Monitoring services at no charge, please log on to <https://bfs.cyberscout.com/activate> and follow the instructions provided. When prompted please provide the following unique code to receive services:

In order for you to receive the monitoring services described above, you must enroll within 90 days from the date of this letter. The enrollment requires an internet connection and e-mail account and may not be available to minors under the age of 18 years of age. Please note that when signing up for monitoring services, you may be asked to verify personal information for your own protection to confirm your identity.

Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order a free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. Consumers may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of their credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If consumers are the victim of identity theft, they are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should consumers wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a “credit freeze” on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer’s express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in a consumer’s name without consent. However, consumers should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in their credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application they make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, consumers cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on their credit report. To request a credit freeze, individuals may need to provide some or all of the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver’s license or ID card, etc.); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if they are a victim of identity theft.
