The investigation into this matter is ongoing, and this notice will be supplemented with any new significant facts learned subsequent to its submission. By providing this notice, Lighthouse Electric Company (“LEC”) does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Nebraska law, the applicability of the Nebraska data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On or around October 26, 2024, LEC became aware of suspicious activity within its network. In response, LEC began an investigation to determine the full nature and scope of the event. LEC’s investigation determined that certain files on LEC’s network were copied without authorization between October 21, 2024, and October 26, 2024. LEC conducted a comprehensive review of the affected files to identify the types of information contained and to whom the information relates. On or about December 23, 2024, LEC completed its review and determined that the affected files contained certain information related to eight (8) Nebraska residents.

The information that could have been subject to unauthorized access includes name, Social Security number and financial account information.

Notice to Nebraska Residents

On or about February 4, 2025, LEC provided written notice of this event to eight (8) Nebraska residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as ***Exhibit A***.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, LEC moved quickly to investigate and respond to the event, assess the security of LEC systems, and identify potentially affected individuals. Further, LEC notified law enforcement regarding the event. LEC is also working to implement additional safeguards and training to its employees. LEC is providing access to credit monitoring services for twenty-four (24) months, through IDX, to individuals whose information was potentially affected by this event, at no cost to these individuals.

Additionally, LEC is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud. In doing so, LEC is providing individuals with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one’s credit file, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud. Finally, LEC is providing written notice of this event to relevant state regulators, as necessary.

Lighthouse Electric Company (“LEC”) is writing to make you aware of an event that may impact the privacy of some of your information. In this letter, LEC provides information about the event, our response, and steps you may take to further protect your information, should you feel it is appropriate to do so.

What Happened? On or around October 26, 2024, LEC became aware of suspicious activity within its network. In response, we began an investigation to determine the full nature and scope of the event. Our investigation determined that certain files on LEC’s network may have been copied without authorization between October 21, 2024, and October 26, 2024. We conducted a comprehensive review of the affected files to identify the types of information contained and to whom the information relates. On or about December 23, 2024, we completed our review and determined that the affected files contained certain information relating to you.

What Information Was Involved? The information related to you potentially affected by this event includes the following: your name, Social Security number, bank account information, and health insurance information.

What We Are Doing. We take the confidentiality, privacy, and security of information in our care seriously. In response to this event, we promptly took steps to secure our systems and conducted a detailed investigation to confirm the full nature and scope of the event. LEC is continuing to review and enhance our existing safeguards, policies, and procedures.

As an added precaution, we are also offering you complimentary access to twenty-four months (24) of credit monitoring and identity theft restoration services, through IDX. Please review the instructions in the attached *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Personal Information* for additional information on these services.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors. Further, please review the enclosed “*Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Personal Information*” section of this letter for additional information. We also encourage you to enroll in the complimentary credit monitoring services we are offering you.

STEPS YOU CAN TAKE TO HELP PROTECT YOUR PERSONAL INFORMATION

Enroll in Monitoring Services

- 1. Website and Enrollment.** Scan the QR image or go to <https://app.idx.us/account-creation/protect> and follow the instructions for enrollment using your Enrollment Code provided at the top of the letter.
- 2. Activate the credit monitoring** provided as part of your IDX identity protection membership. The monitoring included in the membership must be activated to be effective. Note: You must have established credit and access to a computer and the internet to use this service. If you need assistance, IDX will be able to assist you.
- 3. Telephone.** Contact IDX at 1-877-934-1063 to gain additional information about this event and speak with knowledgeable representatives about the appropriate steps to take to protect your credit identity.

Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order a free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. Consumers may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of their credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If consumers are the victim of identity theft, they are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should consumers wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a “credit freeze” on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer’s express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in a consumer’s name without consent. However, consumers should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in their credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application they make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, consumers cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on their credit report. To request a credit freeze, individuals may need to provide some or all of the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver’s license or ID card, etc.); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if they are a victim of identity theft.

Additional Information

Consumers may further educate themselves regarding identity theft, fraud alerts, credit freezes, and the steps they can take to protect your personal information by contacting the consumer reporting bureaus, the Federal Trade Commission, or their state Attorney General. The Federal Trade Commission also encourages those who discover that their information has been misused to file a complaint with them. Consumers have the right to file a police report if they ever experience identity theft or fraud. Please note that in order to file a report with law enforcement for identity theft, consumers will likely need to provide some proof that they have been a victim. Instances of known or suspected identity theft should also be reported to law enforcement and the relevant state Attorney General. This notice has not been delayed by law enforcement.
