By providing this notice, Chatsworth Products, Inc. (“CPI”) does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Nebraska law, the applicability of the Nebraska data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

CPI recently became aware of suspicious activity within their computer network. Upon learning of the suspicious activity, CPI immediately took steps to secure their systems and launched an investigation into the nature and scope of the activity with the assistance of third-party cybersecurity and data privacy specialists. The investigation determined that an unauthorized actor accessed the CPI network at various times between September 12, 2024 and September 23, 2024, and certain information contained within those systems was viewed or copied by the unauthorized actor during that time. Upon becoming aware of these findings, CPI undertook a comprehensive and time-intensive review of the data at risk to determine what information was potentially affected, and to whom that information related. Those efforts recently completed, and CPI provided notification to impacted individuals, as well as your office.

The information related to Nebraska residents that could have been involved may vary by individual but includes name, Social Security number, and financial account information.

Notice to Nebraska Residents

On April 8, 2025, CPI provided written notice of this incident to approximately eight (8) Nebraska residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as ***Exhibit A***.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon learning of this event, CPI moved quickly to investigate and respond, assess the security of their network, and notify affected individuals. Additionally, CPI notified federal law enforcement of the event and took steps to ensure the privacy of the data at risk. As part of their ongoing commitment to information security, CPI is also reviewing existing security policies and dedicating significant resources to implement additional cybersecurity measures to further protect against similar events moving forward. CPI is notifying potentially impacted individuals and providing complimentary access to credit monitoring services for twenty-four (24) months, through Experian, to individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by this incident.

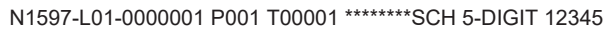
Further, CPI is providing individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud. This includes information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one’s credit file, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

CPI is providing written notice of this incident to relevant state regulators, as necessary, and to the three (3) major credit reporting agencies, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion.

What Happened? CPI recently became aware of suspicious activity within our computer network. Upon learning of the suspicious activity, we immediately took steps to secure our systems and launched an investigation into the nature and scope of the activity with the assistance of third-party cybersecurity and data privacy specialists. The investigation determined that an unauthorized actor accessed our network at various times between September 12, 2024 and September 23, 2024, and certain information contained within those systems was viewed or copied by the unauthorized actor during that time. Upon becoming aware of these findings, we undertook a comprehensive and time-intensive review of the data at risk to determine what information was potentially affected, and to whom that information related. Those efforts recently completed, and CPI is notifying you because the investigation determined that certain information relating to you was contained within the impacted files.

What We Are Doing. We take this event seriously, and the confidentiality, privacy, and security of information in our care is among our highest priorities. Upon learning of this event, we moved quickly to investigate and respond, assess the security of our network, and notify affected individuals. Additionally, we notified federal law enforcement of the event and took steps to ensure the privacy of the data at risk. As part of our ongoing commitment to information security, we are also reviewing existing security policies and dedicating significant resources to implement additional cybersecurity measures to further protect against similar events moving forward. We are also notifying impacted individuals, including you, so they may take steps to best protect their information, should they feel it is appropriate to do so.

As an added precaution, we are offering you immediate access to credit monitoring and identity theft protection services for twenty-four (24) months at no cost to you, through Experian. You can find information on how to enroll in these services in the enclosed *STEPS YOU CAN TAKE TO HELP PROTECT YOUR INFORMATION*. We encourage you to enroll in these services as we are not able to do so on your behalf.



What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors over the next twelve (12) to twenty-four (24) months. As best practice, you should frequently change your password for all online accounts. If your username and password is potentially impacted by this event, we encourage you to change the passwords, along with the security questions and answers, for all your online accounts. You can review the enclosed *STEPS YOU CAN TAKE TO HELP PROTECT YOUR INFORMATION* to learn helpful tips on steps you can take to protect against possible information misuse, should you feel it appropriate to do so. You may also enroll in the complimentary credit monitoring services we are offering to you.

Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three (3) major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order a free credit report, visit <https://www.annualcreditreport.com> or call, toll-free, 1 (877) 322-8228. Consumers may also directly contact the three (3) major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of their credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a one (1) year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If consumers are the victim of identity theft, they are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven (7) years. Should consumers wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any of the three (3) major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a “credit freeze” on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer’s express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in a consumer’s name without consent. However, consumers should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in their credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application they make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, consumers cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on their credit report. To request a credit freeze, individuals may need to provide some or all of the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Addresses for the prior two (2) to five (5) years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver’s license or ID card, etc.); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if they are a victim of identity theft.

Additional Information

Consumers may further educate themselves regarding identity theft, fraud alerts, credit freezes, and the steps they can take to protect your personal information by contacting the consumer reporting bureaus, the Federal Trade Commission, or their state Attorney General. This notice has not been delayed by law enforcement.

Further, pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act, the consumer reporting bureaus must correct or delete inaccurate, incomplete, or unverifiable information; consumer reporting agencies may not report outdated negative information; access to consumers' files is limited; consumers must give consent for credit reports to be provided to employers; consumers may limit "prescreened" offers of credit and insurance based on information in their credit report; and consumers may seek damages from violators. Consumers may have additional rights under the Fair Credit Reporting Act not summarized here. Identity theft victims and active-duty military personnel have specific additional rights pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act.
