We represent University of St. Thomas-Houston (“USTH”) located at 3800 Montrose Blvd, Houston, Texas 77006, and are writing to notify your office of an incident that may affect the security of certain personal information relating to sixteen (16) Nebraska residents. USTH does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Nebraska law, the applicability of the Nebraska data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On or about August 12, 2025, USTH became aware of suspicious activity within its computer network. Upon discovery, USTH immediately took steps to secure its network and began working with third-party specialists to determine the full nature and scope of the activity. USTH also promptly notified law enforcement. The investigation determined that there was unauthorized access to certain systems within the USTH environment between July 25, 2025, and August 12, 2025, and that certain files were accessed and/or acquired by an unauthorized actor during that time. Upon completion of the investigation, USTH undertook a thorough and time-intensive review of the files impacted to determine the information contained therein and to whom the information related. USTH recently completed this review and are now notifying individuals based on the results.

The information that could have been impacted includes name, name, Social Security number, date of birth, financial account information, health insurance information, and security questions/answers.

Notice to Nebraska Residents

On or about March 26, 2026, USTH provided written notice of this incident to sixteen (16) Nebraska residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as *Exhibit A*.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, USTH moved quickly to investigate and respond to the incident, assess the security of USTH systems, and identify potentially affected individuals. Further, USTH notified federal law enforcement regarding the event. USTH is also working to implement additional safeguards and training to its employees. USTH is providing access to credit monitoring services for twelve (12) months through Experian, to individuals whose personal information was potentially affected by this incident, at no cost to these individuals.

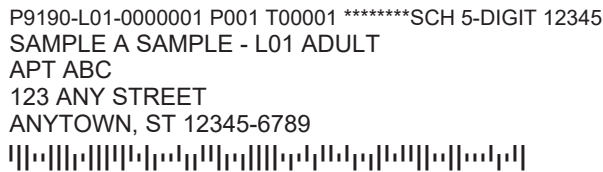
Additionally, USTH is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud, including advising individuals to report any suspected incidents of identity theft or fraud to their credit card company and/or bank. USTH is providing individuals with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one’s credit file, information on protecting against tax fraud, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

USTH is providing written notice of this incident to relevant state regulators, as necessary, and to the three major credit reporting agencies, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion.

The University of St. Thomas-Houston (“USTH”) is writing to inform you of an incident that may involve some of your personal information. This letter explains the incident, our response to it, and steps you may take to protect your information, should you feel it necessary to do so.

What Happened? On or about August 12, 2025, USTH became aware of suspicious activity within our computer network. Upon discovery, we immediately took steps to secure our network and began working with third-party specialists to determine the full nature and scope of the activity. We also promptly notified law enforcement. The investigation determined that there was unauthorized access to certain systems within the USTH environment between July 25, 2025, and August 12, 2025, and that certain files were accessed and/or acquired by an unauthorized actor during that time. Upon completion of the investigation, we undertook a thorough and time-intensive review of the files impacted to determine the information contained therein and to whom the information related. We recently completed this review and are now notifying individuals based on the results.

What Information Was Involved? The investigation determined that files containing your name, and [Extral (Data Elements Impacted)] may have been accessed and/or acquired by an authorized party as a result of this event. At this time, we are not aware of any identity theft or fraud in connection with this incident.

What We Are Doing. We take this event and the security of personal information in our care very seriously. Upon learning of this incident, we promptly took steps to ensure the security of our systems and conducted a thorough investigation. As part of our ongoing commitment to the privacy of information in our care, we are reviewing our existing policies and procedures and are implementing additional technical security measures to reduce the likelihood of a similar incident. We have also reported this incident to law enforcement as well as the appropriate regulators.

As an added precaution, we are offering you access to ## months of credit monitoring and identity theft protection services by Experian IdentityWorksSM at no cost to you. If you wish to activate these services, you may follow the instructions included in the attached *Steps You Can Take to Protect Personal Information*.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant over the next 12 to 24 months against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements, monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity, and reporting any suspected identity theft your financial institution. Please review the enclosed *Steps You Can Take to Protect Personal Information*, which contains information on what you can do to better safeguard against possible misuse of your information.

Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order a free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. Consumers may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of their credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If consumers are the victim of identity theft, they are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should consumers wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a “credit freeze” on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer’s express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in a consumer’s name without consent. However, consumers should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in their credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application they make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, consumers cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on their credit report. To request a credit freeze, individuals may need to provide some or all of the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver’s license or ID card, etc.); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if they are a victim of identity theft.

Additional Information

Consumers may further educate themselves regarding identity theft, fraud alerts, credit freezes, and the steps they can take to protect your personal information by contacting the consumer reporting bureaus, the Federal Trade Commission, or their state Attorney General. Please note that in order to file a report with law enforcement for identity theft, consumers will likely need to provide some proof that they have been a victim. Further, pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act, the consumer reporting bureaus must correct or delete inaccurate, incomplete, or unverifiable information; consumer reporting agencies may not report outdated negative information; access to consumers' files is limited; consumers must give consent for credit reports to be provided to employers; consumers may limit "prescreened" offers of credit and insurance based on information in their credit report; and consumers may seek damages from violators. Consumers may have additional rights under the Fair Credit Reporting Act not summarized here. Identity theft victims and active-duty military personnel have specific additional rights pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act.
