By providing this notice, SRAM, LLC (“SRAM”) does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Nebraska law, the applicability of the Nebraska data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

Nature of the Data Event

On March 15, 2025, SRAM became aware of suspicious activity in its network. SRAM promptly took steps to secure its systems and initiated an investigation into the nature and scope of the event. The investigation determined that data on certain SRAM systems may have been accessed or acquired without authorization from March 6, 2025, to March 15, 2025. In response, SRAM reviewed the data involved to determine the individuals who may have been affected by the event. On March 26, 2025, SRAM identified certain individuals with personal information in scope of the event. The information that may be involved includes name, Social Security number, driver’s license or state identification number, and financial account information.

Notice to Nebraska Residents

On or about April 10, 2025, SRAM began providing written notice of this event to approximately three (3) Nebraska residents. Written notice is being provided in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as ***Exhibit A***.

Other Steps Taken and To Be Taken

Upon discovering the event, SRAM moved quickly to respond and investigate the suspicious activity, secure its network, and notify potentially affected individuals. Further, SRAM notified federal law enforcement regarding the event. SRAM is also reviewing its policies and procedures to reduce the likelihood of similar future events. SRAM is providing access to credit monitoring services for twenty-four (24) months, through Cyberscout through Identity Force, a TransUnion company, to individuals whose personal information was potentially involved in this event, at no cost to these individuals.

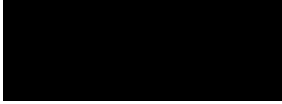
Additionally, SRAM is providing impacted individuals with guidance on how to better protect against identity theft and fraud, including advising individuals to report any suspected incidents of identity theft or fraud to their financial institution. SRAM is providing individuals with information on how to place a fraud alert and security freeze on one’s credit file, the contact details for the national consumer reporting agencies, information on how to obtain a free credit report, a reminder to remain vigilant for incidents of fraud and identity theft by reviewing account statements and monitoring free credit reports, and encouragement to contact the Federal Trade Commission, their state Attorney General, and law enforcement to report attempted or actual identity theft and fraud.

SRAM is providing written notice of this event to relevant state regulators, as necessary, and to the three major credit reporting agencies, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion.

NOTICE OF DATA EVENT

SRAM, LLC ("SRAM") writes to inform you of an event that may involve your personal information. This letter contains information about the event, our response, and the resources available to you to help protect your personal information, should you feel it appropriate to do so.

What Happened? On March 15, 2025, SRAM became aware of suspicious activity in our network. We promptly took steps to secure our systems and initiated an investigation into the nature and scope of the event. The investigation determined that data on certain SRAM systems may have been accessed or acquired without authorization from March 6, 2025, to March 15, 2025. In response, SRAM reviewed the data involved to determine the individuals who may have been affected by the event. On March 26, 2025, SRAM identified certain individuals with personal information in scope of the event.

What Information Was Involved? The personal information related to you in the affected files may include your name and one or more of the following: Social Security number, driver's license or state identification number, passport or other governmental identification number, financial account information, medical information, health insurance information, date of birth, and birth or marriage certificate.

What We Are Doing. We take this event and the security of information in our care seriously. We moved quickly to respond and investigate the suspicious activity, secure our network, and notify potentially affected individuals. As part of our ongoing commitment to information security, we are reviewing our policies and procedures to reduce the likelihood of similar future events. We notified federal law enforcement and will be notifying relevant regulators, as required.

As an added precaution, we are also offering twenty-four (24) months of complimentary access to credit monitoring services through Cyberscout, a TransUnion company. Individuals who wish to receive these services can enroll by following the enrollment instructions contained in the *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Personal Information*. We are unable to enroll you on your behalf.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitoring free credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors. Suspicious activity should be promptly reported to relevant parties, such as your financial institution. Additional information and resources may be found below in the *Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Personal Information*.

Steps You Can Take To Help Protect Personal Information

Enroll in Monitoring Services

We are providing you with access to **Single Bureau Credit Monitoring/Single Bureau Credit Report/Single Bureau Credit Score** services at no charge. These services provide you with alerts for twenty-four (24) months from the date of enrollment when changes occur to your credit file. This notification is sent to you the same day that the change or update takes place with the credit bureau. Finally, we are providing you with proactive fraud assistance to help with any questions that you might have or in event that you become a victim of fraud. These services will be provided by Cyberscout, a TransUnion company specializing in fraud assistance and remediation services.

How do I enroll for the free services?

To enroll in Credit Monitoring services at no charge, please log on to <https://bfs.cyberscout.com/activate> and follow the instructions provided. When prompted please provide the following unique code to receive services: [REDACTED]. In order for you to receive the monitoring services described above, you must enroll within 90 days from the date of this letter. The enrollment requires an internet connection and e-mail account and may not be available to minors under the age of 18 years of age. Please note that when signing up for monitoring services, you may be asked to verify personal information for your own protection to confirm your identity.

Monitor Your Accounts

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order a free credit report, visit www.annualcreditreport.com or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. Consumers may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of their credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended “fraud alert” on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer’s credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer’s credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer’s identity before extending new credit. If consumers are the victim of identity theft, they are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should consumers wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a “credit freeze” on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer’s express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in a consumer’s name without consent. However, consumers should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in their credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application they make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, consumers cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on their credit report. To request a credit freeze, individuals may need to provide some or all of the following information:

1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
2. Social Security number;
3. Date of birth;
4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;

6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver's license or ID card, etc.); and
7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if they are a victim of identity theft.

Additional Information

Consumers may further educate themselves regarding identity theft, fraud alerts, credit freezes, and the steps they can take to protect your personal information by contacting the consumer reporting bureaus, the Federal Trade Commission, or their state Attorney General. The Federal Trade Commission also encourages those who discover that their information has been misused to file a complaint with them. Consumers have the right to file a police report if they ever experience identity theft or fraud. Please note that in order to file a report with law enforcement for identity theft, consumers will likely need to provide some proof that they have been a victim. Instances of known or suspected identity theft should also be reported to law enforcement and the relevant state Attorney General. This notice has not been delayed by law enforcement.

Further, pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act, the consumer reporting bureaus must correct or delete inaccurate, incomplete, or unverifiable information; consumer reporting agencies may not report outdated negative information; access to consumers' files is limited; consumers must give consent for credit reports to be provided to employers; consumers may limit "prescreened" offers of credit and insurance based on information in their credit report; and consumers may seek damages from violators. Consumers may have additional rights under the Fair Credit Reporting Act not summarized here. Identity theft victims and active-duty military personnel have specific additional rights pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act.
