Dear Attorney General Hilgers:

We represent Central Kansas Mental Health Center (“CKMHC”) with respect to a data security incident involving personal information as described below. CKMHC is a mental health center located in Salina, Kansas. CKMHC is a Covered Entity under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (“HIPAA”). CKMHC takes the security of the information in its control seriously and is committed to answering any questions you may have regarding this event.

1. Nature of security incident

On or around September 26, 2025, CKMHC discovered suspicious activity in its network. CKMHC immediately implemented its incident response protocols, took the network offline, and engaged external cybersecurity experts to conduct an investigation. On October 20, 2025, this investigation determined that an unauthorized individual gained access to CKMHC systems for a limited period of time and may have accessed certain files during this time. CKMHC then conducted a thorough review of these files to determine whose information may have been impacted. This review was completed on May 6, 2026.

Impacted information includes names with some combination of the following: addresses, dates of birth, Social Security numbers, driver’s license numbers or state ID numbers, financial account information, payment card information, federally issued ID numbers, health insurance information, and medical information.

2. Number of Nebraska residents affected

Two hundred and sixty-eight (268) residents of Nebraska were notified of the incident. Notification letters were sent to potentially affected individuals on June 24, 2026. A copy of the notification letter is attached as Exhibit A.

3. Steps taken in response to the incident

In response to the incident, CKMHC changed system and user passwords, restored its systems, notified law enforcement, and implemented additional endpoint threat detection tools in the network, among other measures. Additionally, affected individuals were offered 12 months of credit monitoring and identity protection services through TransUnion.

CKMHC notified its federal regulator, the Department of Health and Human Services Office of Civil Rights, of this incident in a timely manner and provided substitute notice by posting information about the incident on its website.

NOTICE OF DATA SECURITY

Dear [REDACTED],

Central Kansas Mental Health Center (CKMHC) is writing to inform you of a recent data security incident that may have impacted some of your personal information. CKMHC may have received your personal information if you are or were a person receiving services at CKMHC.

We take the privacy and security of personal information in our control seriously. This letter contains information about steps you can take to protect your information, and resources we have made available to help you.

What Happened?

On or around September 26, 2025, we discovered suspicious activity in our network. We immediately implemented our incident response protocols, took our network offline, and engaged external cybersecurity experts to conduct an investigation. On October 20, 2025, this investigation determined that an unauthorized individual gained access to CKMHC systems for a limited period of time and may have accessed certain files during this time. We then conducted a thorough review of these files to determine whose information may have been impacted. This review was completed on May 6, 2026.

What Information Was Involved?

The review determined that your name, date of service, MRN or patient number, date of birth, SSN / ITIN may have been impacted during the incident.

What We Are Doing:

We want to assure you that we are taking steps to minimize the risk of this happening in the future. Since the incident, CKMHC has changed system and user passwords, restored our systems, notified law enforcement, and implemented additional endpoint threat detection tools in our network, among other measures. In addition, while we are not aware of any misuse of personal information, we are providing you with complimentary credit monitoring and identity protection services at no cost to you through Cyberscout, a TransUnion company for 12 months.

What You Can Do:

We are providing you with access to **Single Bureau Credit Monitoring/Single Bureau Credit Report/Single Bureau Credit Score** services at no charge. These services provide you with alerts for 12 months from the date of enrollment when changes occur to your credit file. This notification is sent to you the same day that the change or update takes place with the bureau. Finally, we are providing you with proactive fraud assistance to help with any questions that you might have or in event that you become a victim of fraud. These services will be provided by Cyberscout, a TransUnion company specializing in fraud assistance and remediation services.

To enroll in Credit Monitoring services at no charge, please log on to <https://bfs.cyberscout.com/activate> and follow the instructions provided. When prompted please provide the following unique code to receive services: [REDACTED]. In order for you to receive the monitoring services described above, you must enroll within 90 days from the date of this letter. The enrollment requires an internet connection and e-mail account and may not be available to minors under the age of 18 years of age. Please note that when signing up for monitoring services, you may be asked to verify personal information for your own protection to confirm your identity

Again, at this time, there is no evidence that personal information has been misused. However, we encourage you to take full advantage of this service offering. Cyberscout representatives have been fully versed on the incident and can answer questions or concerns you may have regarding protection of your information. We also encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft by reviewing bank accounts, explanations of benefits (EOBs), and other financial statements.

Recommended Steps to help Protect your Information

1. Review your credit reports. We recommend that you remain vigilant by reviewing account statements and monitoring credit reports. Under federal law, you also are entitled every 12 months to one free copy of your credit report from each of the three major credit reporting companies. To obtain a free annual credit report, go to www.annualcreditreport.com or call 1-877-322-8228. You may wish to stagger your requests so that you receive a free report by one of the three credit bureaus every four months.

You should also know that you have the right to file a police report if you ever experience identity fraud. Please note that in order to file a crime report or incident report with law enforcement for identity theft, you will likely need to provide some kind of proof that you have been a victim. A police report is often required to dispute fraudulent items. You can report suspected incidents of identity theft to local law enforcement or to the Attorney General.

2. Place Fraud Alerts with the three credit bureaus. If you choose to place a fraud alert, we recommend you do this after activating your credit monitoring. You can place a fraud alert at one of the three major credit bureaus by phone and also via Experian's or Equifax's website. A fraud alert tells creditors to follow certain procedures, including contacting you, before they open any new accounts or change your existing accounts. For that reason, placing a fraud alert can protect you, but also may delay you when you seek to obtain credit. The contact information for all three bureaus is as follows:

It is necessary to contact only ONE of these bureaus and use only ONE of these methods. As soon as one of the three bureaus confirms your fraud alert, the others are notified to place alerts on their records as well.

You will receive confirmation letters in the mail and will then be able to order all three credit reports, free of charge, for your review. An initial fraud alert will last for one year.

Please Note: No one is allowed to place a fraud alert on your credit report except you.

3. Security Freeze. By placing a security freeze, someone who fraudulently acquires your personal identifying information will not be able to use that information to open new accounts or borrow money in your name. You will need to contact the three national credit reporting bureaus listed above to place the freeze. Keep in mind that when you place the freeze, you will not be able to borrow money, obtain instant credit, or get a new credit card until you temporarily lift or permanently remove the freeze. There is no cost to freeze or unfreeze your credit files.

4. You can obtain additional information about the steps you can take to avoid identity theft from the following agencies. The Federal Trade Commission also encourages those who discover that their information has been misused to file a complaint with them.

Further, pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act, the consumer reporting agencies must correct or delete inaccurate, incomplete, or unverifiable information; consumer reporting agencies may not report outdated negative information; access to your file is limited; you must give your consent for credit reports to be provided to employers; you may limit “prescreened” offers of credit and insurance you get based on information in your credit report; and you may seek damages from a violator. You may have additional rights under the Fair Credit Reporting Act not summarized here. Identity theft victims and active duty military personnel have specific additional rights pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act.
