Dear Attorney General Hilgers:

We represent JRK Property Holdings, Inc. (“JRK”) with respect to a data security incident involving personal information described below. JRK takes the security of the information in its control seriously and is committed to answering any questions you may have about the data security incident, its response, and steps taken to prevent a similar incident from occurring in the future.

1. Nature of security incident.

On March 26, 2026, JRK was alerted to unusual activity involving its information technology environment. In response, JRK initiated incident response protocols, took steps to secure its systems, and engaged cybersecurity experts to assist with the investigation. Additionally, a third-party forensic firm was engaged to assist in the investigation. On April 22, 2026, JRK’s investigation determined that an unauthorized party may have accessed files containing personal information, including names and one or more of the following: addresses, financial account names and numbers, Social Security numbers, dates of birth, and other personal financial information.

2. Number of residents affected.

1 Nebraska resident was notified of the incident. The potentially impacted individual was notified on May 5, 2026. A copy of the form notification letter is enclosed as Exhibit A.

3. Steps taken in response to the incident.

Since the incident, JRK has taken steps to prevent a similar incident in the future. JRK implemented and will continue to adopt additional safeguards and technical security measures to further protect its systems. Additionally, letters were mailed to potentially affected individuals, beginning on May 5, 2026, which included instructions for enrolling in 12 months of credit monitoring and identity protection services through Experian at no cost.

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NOTICE OF DATA BREACH

Dear <<Full Name>>,

We are writing to let you know about a recent data security incident that may have involved some of your information. At the outset, we want to assure you that we do not believe that any of your information has been or will be made public. This letter contains information about steps you can take to protect your information and the resources we are making available to help you.

What Happened? On March 26, 2026, we identified suspicious activity associated with our network. As soon as we became aware of the activity, we immediately initiated our incident response protocols, took steps to secure our systems, and engaged cybersecurity experts to assist with the investigation. Our systems have been fully restored, and this data security incident has had minimal impact on our business or your investment.

What Information Was Involved? On April 22, 2026, our investigation determined that some of your personal information may have been accessed by an unauthorized individual, including your name, address, Social Security number, and bank account information. However, as noted above, we do not believe that any of that information has or will be made public.

What We Are Doing: The confidentiality, privacy, and security of your information are among our highest priorities. To help prevent something like this from happening again, we have implemented additional safeguards and technical security measures to further protect and monitor our systems. We are notifying potentially impacted individuals, including you, so that you may take steps to best protect your information, should you feel it is appropriate to do so. As an added precaution, we are offering you immediate access to credit monitoring and identity theft protection services for 12 months at no cost to you, through Experian. You can find information on how to enroll in these services included with this letter.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors. We remind you it is always advisable to be vigilant for incidents of fraud or identity theft by reviewing your account statements and free credit reports for any unauthorized activity over the next 12 to 24 months. You may obtain a copy of your credit report, free of charge, once every 12 months from each of the three nationwide credit reporting companies. If you believe you are the victim of identity theft or have reason to believe your personal information has been misused, you should immediately contact the Federal Trade Commission and/or the Attorney General's office in your state. You can obtain information from these sources about steps an individual can take to avoid identity theft as well as information about fraud alerts and security freezes. You should also contact your local law enforcement authorities and file a police report. Fraud Alerts and Credit or Security Freezes:

Fraud Alerts: There are two types of general fraud alerts you can place on your credit report to put your creditors on notice that you may be a victim of fraud—an initial alert and an extended alert. You may ask that an initial fraud alert be placed on your credit report if you suspect you have been, or are about to be, a victim of identity theft. An initial fraud alert stays on your credit report for one year. You may have an extended alert placed on your credit report if you have already been a victim of identity theft with the appropriate documentary proof. An extended fraud alert stays on your credit report for seven years.

To place a fraud alert on your credit reports, contact one of the nationwide credit bureaus. A fraud alert is free. The credit bureau you contact must tell the other two, and all three will place an alert on their versions of your report.

For those in the military who want to protect their credit while deployed, an Active Duty Military Fraud Alert lasts for one year and can be renewed for the length of your deployment. The credit bureaus will also take you off their marketing lists for pre-screened credit card offers for two years, unless you ask them not to.

Credit or Security Freezes: You have the right to put a credit freeze, also known as a security freeze, on your credit file, free of charge, which makes it more difficult for identity thieves to open new accounts in your name. That is because most creditors need to see your credit report before they approve a new account. If they cannot see your report, they may not extend the credit.

How do I place a freeze on my credit reports? There is no fee to place or lift a security freeze. Unlike a fraud alert, you must separately place a security freeze on your credit file at each credit reporting company. For information and instructions to place a security freeze, contact each of the credit reporting agencies at the addresses below:

You will need to supply your name, address, date of birth, Social Security number and other personal information.

After receiving your freeze request, each credit bureau will provide you with a unique PIN (personal identification number) or password. Keep the PIN or password in a safe place. You will need it if you choose to lift the freeze.

How do I lift a freeze? A freeze remains in place until you ask the credit bureau to temporarily lift it or remove it altogether. If the request is made online or by phone, a credit bureau must lift a freeze within one hour. If the request is made by mail, then the bureau must lift the freeze no later than three business days after getting your request.

If you opt for a temporary lift because you are applying for credit or a job, and you can find out which credit bureau the business will contact for your file, you can save some time by lifting the freeze only at that particular credit bureau. Otherwise, you need to make the request with all three credit bureaus.

A Summary of Your Rights Under the Fair Credit Reporting Act: The federal Fair Credit Reporting Act (FCRA) promotes the accuracy, fairness, and privacy of information in the files of consumer reporting agencies. There are many types of consumer reporting agencies, including credit bureaus and specialty agencies (such as agencies that sell information about check writing histories, medical records, and rental history records). Your major rights under the FCRA are summarized below. - You must be told if information in their file has been used against them.
- You have the right to know what is in their file.
- You have the right to ask for a credit score.
- You have the right to dispute incomplete or inaccurate information.
- Consumer reporting agencies must correct or delete inaccurate, incomplete, or unverifiable information.
- Consumer reporting agencies may not report outdated negative information.
- Access to your file is limited.
- You must give their consent for reports to be provided to employers.
- You may limit “prescreened” offers of credit and insurance they get based on information in their credit report.
- You have a right to place a “security freeze” on your credit report, which will prohibit a consumer reporting agency from releasing information in your credit report without your express authorization.
- You may seek damages from violators.
- Identity theft victims and active duty military personnel have additional rights.

New Mexico Residents: You have rights pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act, such as the right to be told if information in your credit file has been used against you, the right to know what is in your credit file, the right to ask for your credit score, and the right to dispute incomplete or inaccurate information. Further, pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act, the consumer reporting agencies must correct or delete inaccurate, incomplete, or unverifiable information; consumer reporting agencies may not report outdated negative information; access to your file is limited; you must give your consent for credit reports to be provided to employers; you may limit “prescreened” offers of credit and insurance you get based on information in your credit report; and you may seek damages from a violator. You may have additional rights under the Fair Credit Reporting Act not summarized here. Identity theft victims and active duty military personnel have specific additional rights pursuant to the Fair Credit Reporting Act.
